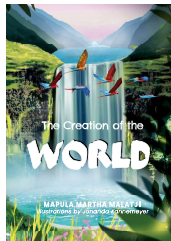
Prayer

Dear God, please help us to take care of our health and our bodies. Teach us not to laugh at those who are different from us.

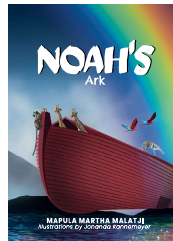
Questions

5. Would you rather have physical muscles or faith muscles in God?

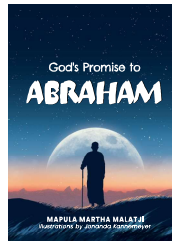
