

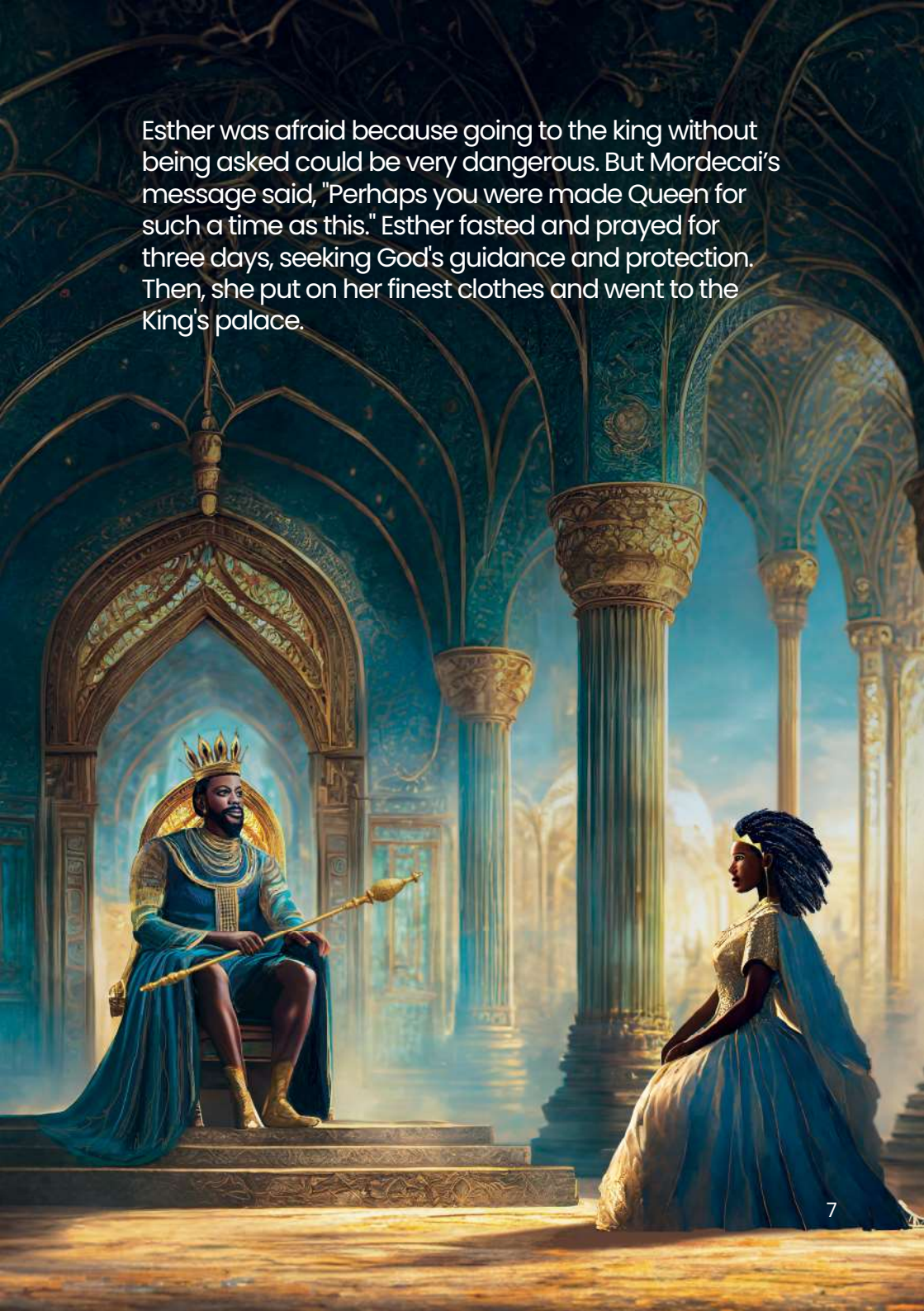

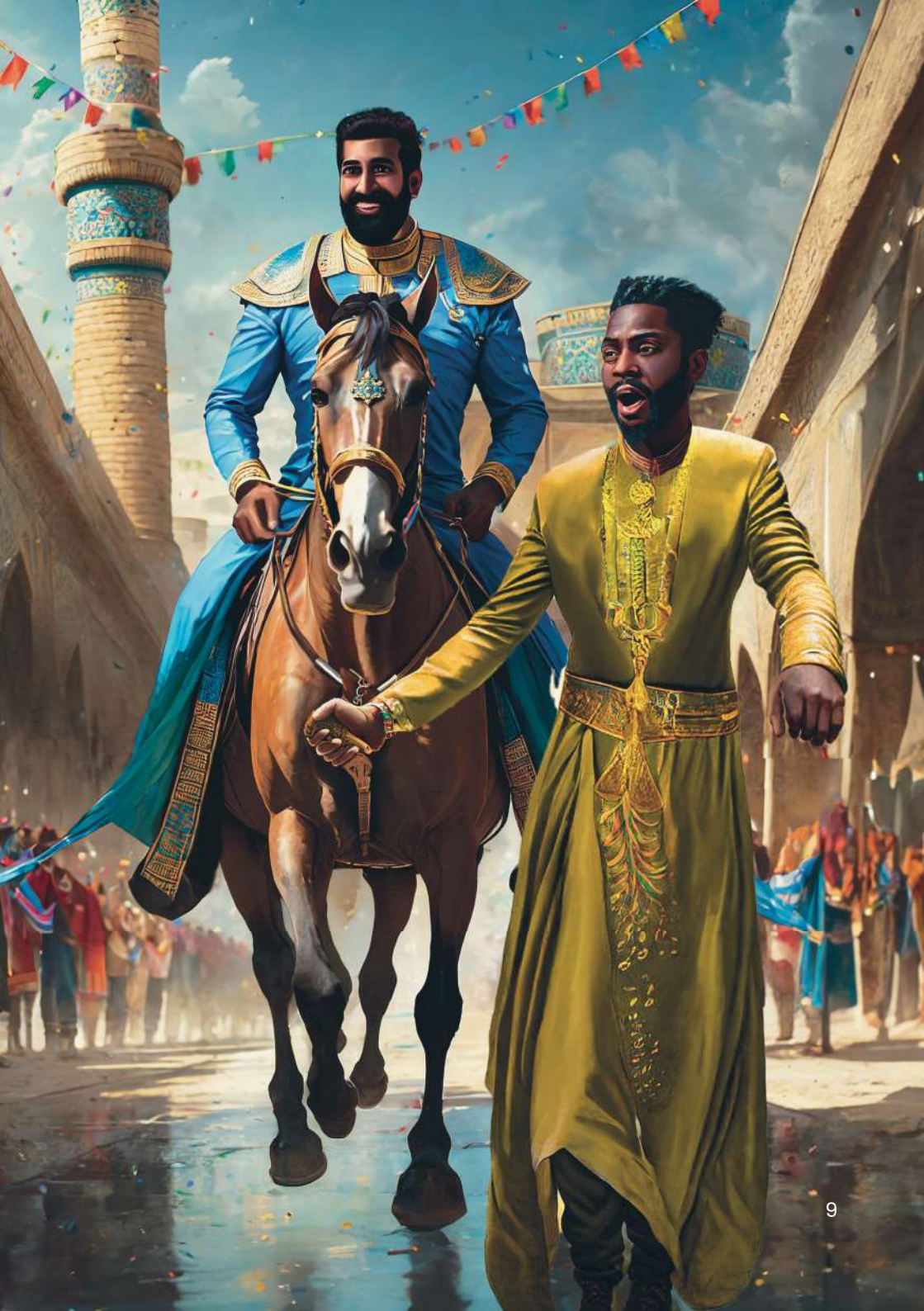

A young girl named Sebotsana lost her parents in the flood. The girl and her uncle Elijah survived but Sebotsana hurt her back and ended up in a wheelchair. They were not from South Africa, and their language was different from the people in the village. They were taken to an old, empty building in the village.

After the accident, Sebotsana was taken to the hospital. The nurses asked her where she came from. Some treated her badly because she was a foreigner. Sebotsana noticed that the hospital was worn down and the nurses' clothes looked old. She wondered if this was what made them unhappy?

In time, Elijah found work as a mechanic. He also knew how to sew. He taught Sebotsana how to sew as well. He enrolled her in a village school. On the first day, the school children called her names to make fun of her. She was very sad, so she dropped out of school but she kept sewing.

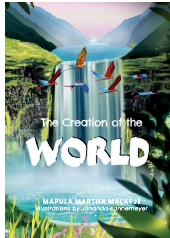

Our heavenly Father, thank You for giving everyone gifts in life. Teach us to be grateful for everyone's gifts.

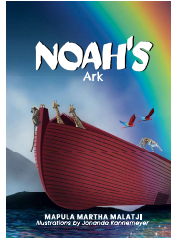
Questions

5. What would you like to be when you grow up?

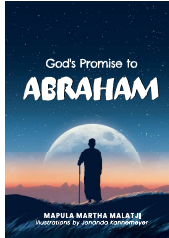
