THE WOMAN

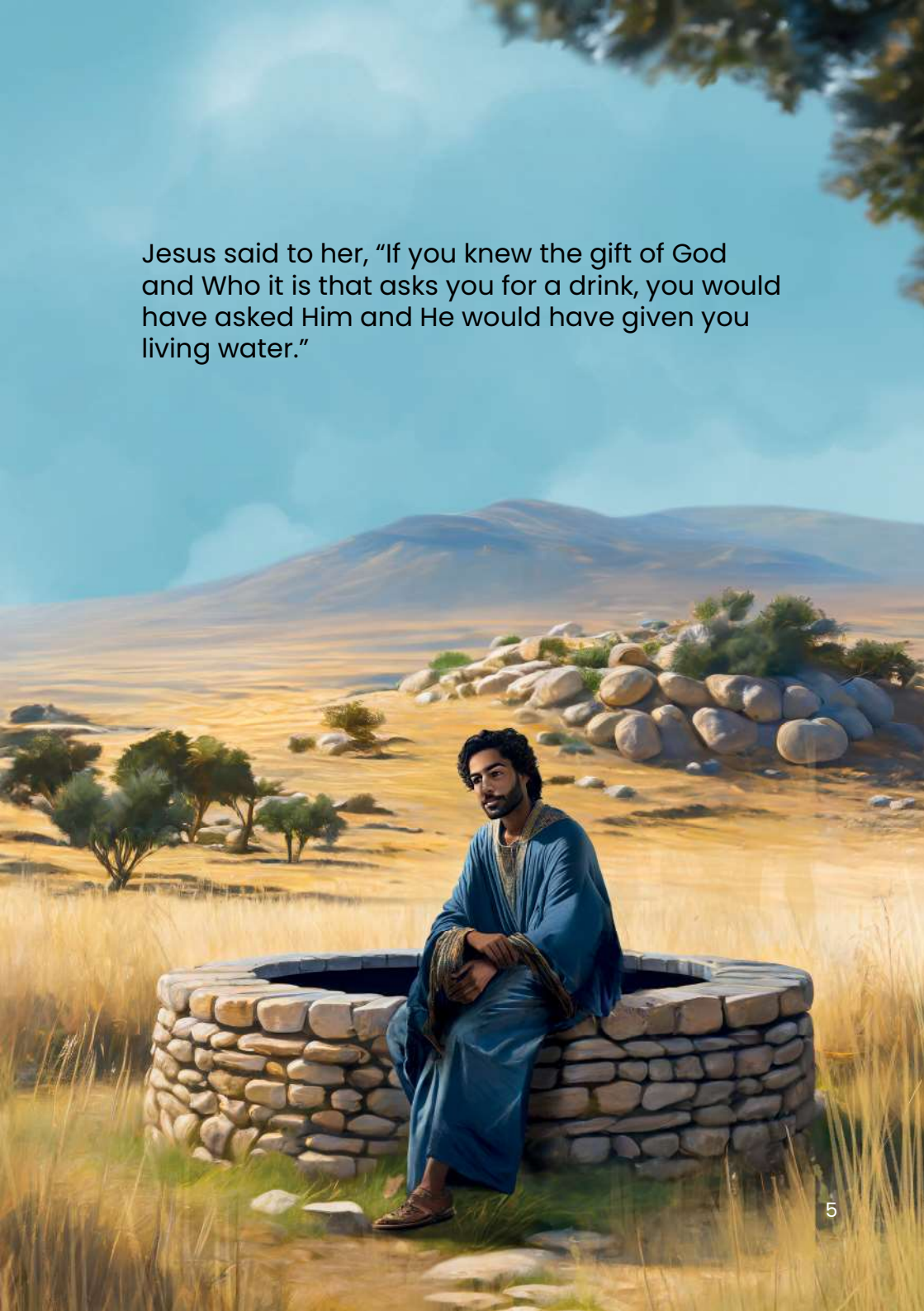
At the Well

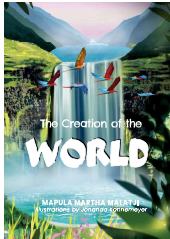
Prayer

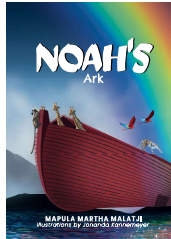
Questions

5. Did the cattle get water in the end?

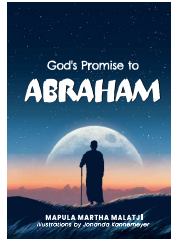
